Publication of Annals

Annals of NAMS are being published from the 'NAMS Centre for Research in Medical Education' at Jodhpur from the issues of year 2013 and the contents of different issues of the Annals - quarterly journals is get uploaded onto NAMS' website as and when it is made available after publication of the Annals. Earlier, the Annals issues for the year 2011 and 2012 couldn't be published due to unforeseen reasons.

Earlier in 2013, after a gap period of 2 years i.e. 2011 & 2012, during NAMSCON 2013 (held at AIIMS, Jodhpur in October, 2013), Dr. Sanjeev Misra, Director, AIIMS, Jodhpur has agreed to publish the NAMS journals from Jodhpur Centre. The first journal printed from Jodhpur under 'NAMS Centre for Research in Medical Education', Jodhpur was on "Sleep Medicine". It was based on CME programme on "Sleep Medicine" held on 25 October, 2013 during NAMSCON 2013 and got printed in mid 2014. After that, 1st issue of the year 2013 on "Golden Jubilee Lectures" was printed by the end of 2014. Efforts have been made to remove the vacuum to make the publication of Annals streamline and up-to-date under the guidance of Honorary Secretary, NAMS.

As on date in the year 2017, Annals issues of 2011, i.e. 47(1&2) & 47(3&4) have been printed. Annals 2012 issues are under process and will be printed soon. With this, the gap of 2011 and 2012 has been significantly reduced and will be over by the end of the year 2017.

Dr. Kuldeep Singh, Associate Editor from the 'NAMS Centre for Research in Medical Education', AIIMS Jodhpur while making a brief presentation before the Council Members on the status of Annals, conveyed that Annals has been indexed in the following:

Dr. Kuldeep Singh also informed that following procedures have been initiated by the Jodhpur Centre –

- (a) ISSN for online version has been obtained which is ISSN 2454:5635 from NISCAIR, Delhi.
- (b) Annals available online on http://annals-nams.in as well as on the Academy website.
- (c) Journal hosted on Open Journal System (OJS), an open source software includes all the functionality from submission, review process, lay-outs editing and for quick online publication only.

All the future issues of Annals of NAMS which will be printed at AIIMS, Jodhpur will be put on the website of National Academy of Medical Sciences by the NAMS Centre for Research in Medical Education, Jodhpur as *http://annals-nams.in* within 3 days of its distribution without involving any extra cost.

First issue of 2017 i.e. Vol. 53(1) is under printing at 'NAMS Centre for Research in Medical Education', Jodhpur. Since 2017, first issue of Vol. 53(1) will be initiated for PUBMED indexing and for that necessary steps are being initiated for the manuscripts, viz.

- Scientific Quality Standards
- Technical Requirements
- Evaluation and Set-up Process
- Pre-application requirements:
 - ISSN: Annals of NAMS has both for hard copy and online
 - At least a two-year history of quality scholarly publishing in the life sciences, a minimum of 25 peer reviewed articles (e.g., original research, review articles and clinical case reports)

- must be published in final form before one can apply.
- ICMJE guidelines (Joint statement by COPE, DOAJ, WAME and OASPA)

To meet the conditionality of PUBMED indexing, all issues from Vol. 53(1), 2017 onwards, will be on A4 size paper, with proper format and will have Editorial, which 'NAMS Centre for Research in Medical Education' at Jodhpur will take care of. Every effort is being made to have more number of manuscripts ready for the other volumes of 2017 issues so that by year end, it becomes a smooth process of publishing Annals systematically.

Mr. President of National Academy of Medical Sciences, my friend Dr. Mukund Joshi and Vice President Dr. Wadhwa, Scretary Dr. Srivastava, House Chairman Dr. N Nagarkar, the Dean Dr. Dhaneria, Dr Alok Agarwal, Dr. Neema, and Members and Fellows of the Medical Sciences, Council Members and Lifetime Achievement Awardee, Air Marshal (Dr.) M.S. Boparai, young Scientists and friends who have won Fellowship today and the Members who are going to be Fellow tomorrow, friends, ladies and gentlemen what excited me today particularly Dr. Alok Agarwal called me, Sir, we have function today. I belong to Shivaji Park. I don't need short notice for any such Wonderful Function where you have the scientists and academicians to be honored. I am honored. That you called me, I think in my life time, it's one of the good achievements to put on this robe, stand here and appreciate upcoming scientists of this country. What impressed me most was a large number of ladies. I think that tells us that this country has a very bright future. Any where there is motherly approach with father's assistance, the product is good. If the product is good, success is assured. Today medical sciences are at cross roads. I have to mention this, because most of the awardees were from established institution with good facilities. What happens to the talent? This is happing because while money matters, the talent is lost. And I can tell you money is not the end. One time in life you feel that you need to achieve something where society will recognize you. And any where the society recognizes you, you feel satisfied, you feel contended. Unfortunately medical fraternity and medicine has undergone turmoil. The institution of family physicians is lost. Small nursing homes can't come. Government, despite of best efforts, is not able to serve because the numbers are very high and to meet that do we compensate with appointing that kind of personnel, technologies, instruments, infrastructure so that the doctor can meet the challenge?

I do not know how many of you who got membership and fellowship but realize that you have the recognition from the fellow of medical sciences, but this NAMS is an organization with an act of parliament. I remember of having an

extremely big argument with MCI chief one day. In few hospitals he said that we will not permit DNB. I thought that was a retrograde step. We are short of registered medical practitioners; we have many brilliant students who want to seek this position. Why can't we upgrade the academy? Recognize the academy on the same platter as we recognize and fund the institutes. I think it is the need of the hour. Any where even a genuine good, private institution, like Shanker Netralay, like Trivandrum Institute, like Ganga Hospital. Why can't it be recognized? It has material, it has men, scientists, it has research. academy should now come forward & tell the Government. I have a feeling - today we have some very receptive personalities in our Govt. Yesterday, I asked Patel Sahab that do you have ear of Prime Minster? I thought that Mr. Patel is from Ahmadabad and if he has ears of him and tells him what academy is doing, I can tell you that the Prime minister will say – is that so? Did you give more than 40-50 Fellowships & 100 Memberships & recognize scientists, so I got a registered scientific pool? I think academy should be equivalent to any other authority. To research we need money. And I have a feeling whatever be the constraints, you need to make out a case, involve private trusts. I remember of excellent philanthropic trust like Dorabji Tata Trust, Shankar Sen's Trust which has excellent reputation including Bill Gate's Foundation. Because you have such a talent and in case you write to them, I am very certain that foundation will come forward. Because the problems related to country, right from the issues of pediatrics to geriatrics with rare disorders are not known in United States. If you do and publish, I predict in five years now there would be reverse brain drain.

What we talked about brain drain from here to America - don't be surprised and that's happening because many of my friends today, whose children are in medical school write to me, I want to send my child for 2 months to India for one single thing - to learn the art & science of diagnosis, to pull him away from technology and make him a human physician. And I think that is something where realization is coming. I could know in Ayush presentation today, I noticed the contribution to recognition of Ayurveda & Ayush is more in US than in our country. This surprised me! A country - that means our society has to be open and for that we need to do one thing - we need to leave our ego. We need change from I to We, and I think that will be right step forward. Today the corporate houses are coming in a big way in the area of medical care & my fear is the treatment & cost will go up because they have taken away the human component from the medical care. I am not against the corporates, I think very high flown research has got to come

because they have money but my contention 'Mr. President' is exploitation of young talent. That's my concern. That young scientists, young doctors who are brilliant, who have no environment. Many of our students turn out, become Post-graduates and what's their problem? When they come out? Have they got atmosphere and, place to work? Place they can start their living? And at the end of nine years & ten years of hard work, just imagine! Should we not think? Because, today we are all concerned about two things; exploitation and consumer protection. Two biggest challenges! And we can it possibly control that challenge; but there is one way that you can control it. And that one way is that you become a part of creating institution, Where you follow seven core issues of health care that institution will produce seven essentials - care, compassion, communication, conscience, co-operation, collaboration to get a confidence, & training in computer so that you are with the world. And I did that experiment in 50 years ago. Today in Mumbai, I have & I have worked where I got Mr. President's appreciation for training in India & community health i.e. Citizen Co-operative Hospital, based on the principle to take health care as right without exploitation and by self participation, and mind you that LIC is one such a example where people participated and today they have become the financer, so while AIIMS are the Apex Institution, citizen's Institution could be Institution where young graduates can start their career as partners, are not exploited but are given an opportunity. Young nursing students are given nursing education, including ward boys as how how to be a good ward boy. I spent 50 years in putting up the institution. All of you think about it - about co-operative co-existence, for your progress, for society's progress, for everybody's progress.

I will end by giving a Sanskrit quotation of my hospital

English meaning is:

To allay the suffering & relieve pain of patient, let us all follow the tenets of Shushruta's teaching with the single aim to giving relief; to give him a good life with reward, not exploitation.

During the year 2016-2017, one meeting of the CME Programme Committee was held on 28th June. 2016.

The Committee, time to time, co-opts Fellows to attend the meeting, depending on the expert advice required based on the topics of discussion and received CME proposals.

Extra-mural CME Programmes: These CME Programmes are run under the aegis of CME Programme Committee of the Academy. To improve the quality and contents of the Extramural CME Programmes funded by the NAMS, proposals received for funding are technically reviewed in the first instance by a subject expert who is also a Fellow of the NAMS. This practice has been followed since July 2004, and the reviewers so designated would evaluate the proposal and identify lacunae, if any, in the programme contents. The reviewers may suggest revision/ modification to be incorporated in the programme. These are communicated and nearly all such suggestions are invariably accepted by the organizers

and only after the CME Scientific Programme are revised that the CME proposals processed for the grant-in-aid. A Fellow of the Academy is designated as Observer to attend and evaluate the extra-mural CME Programme. The Academy provides TA/DA and Honorarium to Fellows who are nominated as Observers to attend, review and submit report on the CME Programmes.

Out of the CME proposals received from various medical institutions/ professional bodies in the country, the Academy has sanctioned partial financial assistance for organizing Nine Extramural CME Programmes during the financial year April 1, 2016 to March 31, 2017.

The details of the Extra-mural CME Programmes funded during April 1, 2016 to March 31, 2017 are placed as Annexure IV.

The total expenditure sanctioned on Extramural CME Programmes during April 1, 2016 to March 31, 2017 is Rs.6,30,500/- (Rupees Six Lakh thirty thousand five hundred) only.

Intramural CME Programmes: These CME Programmes are run under the aegis of Academic Committee of the NAMS. The Academic Committee identifies, from time to time, topics of national and academic relevance for funding as Intramural CME Programmes. Just like for the Extramural CMEs the Academy provides TA/DA and Honorarium to Fellows who attend and submit evaluation report on the CME Programmes as NAMS Observers.

The Academy has funded 3 Intramural CME/Symposia during the year 2016-17.




Fig 1. Comparative representation of expenses incurred on extramural and intramural CME Programmes in 2015-16 and 2016-17.




Fig. 2. The State-Chapter-wise representation of extramural and intramural CME Programmes in 2016-17




Fig. 3 The State-wise distribution of Extramural and Intramural CME Programmes for 2016-17

Report on Extramural CME Programmes from 01.04.2016 to 31.03.2017

1. CME Programme on "Achieving Universal Health Coverage by Application of Principles of Public Health Management" held on 16th - 17th May, 2016 at the School of Public Health, PGIMER., Chandigarh.

Organizing Secretary: Dr. Sonu Goel, Associate Professor, School of Public Health, PGIMER., Chandigarh – 160012.

Main Objectives of the CME Programme

- To enable participants understand the concepts and principles of health management towards achieving universal health coverage.
- To illustrate with relevant case studies as to how Universal Health Coverage can be achieved through effective leadership in health sector.
- To build capacity of middle and senior level managers in effectively utilizing human resource in health towards strengthening of health systems.
- To equip participants on appreciating gaps in current scenario and envision future trends in health care management for effective decision making.

Highlights of the Observer's (Dr. Rajesh Kumar, FAMS) Report

Ambience of the programme was very good, the participants were very enthusiastic and most of the sessions were interactive. All sessions have exercises which gave hands-on experience.

2. CME Programme on "Epidemiology, Biostatistics and Health Research Methodology" held on 11th - 12th July, 2016 at St. John's Research Institute, St. John's National Academy of Health Sciences, Bangalore.

Organizing Secretary: Dr. Prem K. Mony, Head, Division of Epidemiology, Biostatistics and Population Health, St. John's Research Institute & Associate Professor, Dept. of Community Health, St. John's Medical College, Bangalore.

Main Objectives of the CME Programme

- To train at least 30 junior medical faculty/post graduate students per year in epidemiologic methods and statistical methods that can be used on data produced from different epidemiologic study designs.
- To provide practical working knowledge of epidemiology and biostatistics with sufficient Hands-on Practical Exercises.

Highlights of the Observer's (Dr. N. Srinivasa Murthy, FAMS) Report

The number of participants for the programme was more than as envisaged of 30 participants for the programme. The methodology consisted of lectures and demonstrations with highly interactive sessions. Participants were involved to a great extent and were also given exercises at the end of each session. They were asked to evaluate the same immediately after each session in an objective manner employing a 5 point scale. The evaluation and feed-back provided by the participants indicated that they were satisfied and had a good learning opportunity.

The topics included were relevant to the theme. The identification of resource persons were quite appropriate and were based on the experience in health research methodology, epidemiology and biostatistics. It was a well arranged CME Programme and was carried out as per earlier drawn-up schedule. However, there could have been

some invited faculty from other institutions to have multi-lateral view of the subject. The present CME Scientific Programme consisted of many innovative procedures such as: (a) online dissemination of material of the Learning Resource Material (LRM) to each of the participant's laptop before commencement of lectures, (b) feed-back and an on line evaluation of the sessions immediately after presentation by the faculty, (c) feed-back as an open- ended question, (d) continuous video recording of the lectures delivered by the faculty, and (e) hands-on training and practical sessions. The lectures were illustrative and interactive with the participants. I can definitely say that CME Programme was quite effective in terms of achieving pre-defined specific learning objectives.

3. CME Programme on "National Symposium on Preventive Psychiatry" held on 11th September, 2016 at AIIMS. New Delhi.

Organizing Secretary: Dr. Rakesh K. Chadda, FAMS, Professor, Deptt. of Psychiatry, All India Institute of Medical Sciences, Ansari Nagar, New Delhi – 110029.

Main Objectives of the CME Programme

- Sensitization of the postgraduate trainees on the principles of preventive psychiatry.
- To assess their knowledge and update the knowledge regarding preventive psychiatry.
- To enhance their skills and attitude towards preventive psychiatry.
- To equip them in developing and using preventive strategies to allay psychiatric problems in their day to day practice and in the community.

Highlights of the Observer's (Dr.Shridhar Sharma, FAMS) Report

The symposium was well organized. There was a brief inauguration. The scientific programme started at 9.15 A.M. The hall was generally full during the programme. There was an active participation from the audience. Audio visuals were of good quality. All the presentations were relevant. Faculty for the programme had been well selected and represented many leading institutions of the country including AIIMS, New Delhi, PGIMER, Chandigarh, GMCH, Chandigarh, PGIMS, Rohtak, Jamia Hamdard, IHBAS, Delhi and NIMHANS, Bangalore. The Ojbjectives; to sensitise and update the postgraduate trainees on the principles of preventive psychiatry, and to equip them in developing and using preventive strategies in their day to day practice and in the community were fulfilled by the design and execution of the CME Scientific Programme.

4. CME Programme as Preconference Workshop on "Scientific Medical Writing" during the 49th Annual Conference of Indian Pharmacological Society (IPSCON-2016) held on 20th October, 2016 at Gamma Knife Centre, PGIMER., Chandigarh.

Organizing Secretary: Dr. Bikash Medhi, Professor, Deptt. of Pharmacology, PGIMER., Chandigarh –160012.

Main Objectives of the CME Programme

- To familiarize and train junior faculty members and P.G. students in the art and science of Medical Writing after the Clinical Research has been successfully executed.
- To give an understanding to clinical investigators in planning clinical research: sponsored or investigator initiated, accreditation of the research site, regulatory requirements of clinical research, pharmacovigilance during clinical trial, collection and management of clinical data, medical writing and career development in clinical research.

The main objectives of two-day Workshop were to teach the emerging clinicians and scientists and train them in the skills for designing and executing the pertinent clinical study. Further the workshop emphasized on collecting and managing clinical research data, and exploring it for logical conclusions and presentations to the scientific community. The topics covered under this workshop discussed the perspective of clinical operations, investigator-initiated research, accreditations of investigator's site, ethics of clinical research, regulatory pharmacovigilance, medical writing, and career development in Clinical Research.

Highlights of the Observer's (Dr. P. L. Sharma, FAMS) Report

A total 48 participants were registered and generally around 46 were remain present during the Scientific Sessions. The Resource persons provided evidence based information which was of good quality and all sessions were interactive. The participants were provided LRMs before the session started.

Introducing the CME topic the Key speaker stated that medical writing is a much more specialized area of Scientific Writing, whereas Scientific Writing is writing about sciences regardless of whether it is about medicine, chemistry or physics, etc. Thus all medical writers are science writers, while all science writers are not medical writers. Medical writing deals developing Clinical and Scientific documentation in a standard comprehensive, reliable, skilled and convincing manner. Medical writing is an art of writing about a particular content more efficiently and clearly that target audience can simply understand and imbibe it. A medical writer requires a potential to catch every minute detail from the topic and should have the capability to understand and work separately on each of them. Medical writing is an interdisciplinary exercise and needs a meticulous attitude towards collective and analyzing available information and developing a document/chapter as per need. Medical writing is an important and significantly essential function needed at every stage of making a/or developing as a medical/health professional. Different speakers deliberated in different lectures in the interactive workshop on various topics: Why Publish?; Types of Publications; Choosing the Right Journal for publication of your research paper; Structure of an original research paper; Writing a Title, Abstract and Introduction that make a first good impression; Materials and Method: a recipe for success; Reporting Results Writing Discussion — interpreting and analyzing critically, Reference to literature and citations, Ethics of publication and Ethical Misconduct (Plagiarsim, Authorship criteria), etc. Different types of Medical Scientific Writing, such as Medical Journalism, Medical Education, Medical marketing of healthcare products, Publication/ Presentation, Research Documents, Regulatory Documents Writing, etc. were also covered.

Although the conduct of Scientific Programme during the Workshop fulfilled the projected objectives, the arrangements for scientific sessions and local hospitality were handled by volunteers and organizers were not up to the mark and lack optimal standards. The main reason was that the Convenor and his senior staff were being engaged in some other concurrently held workshops and were not able to do the full justice with the Scientific Programmes. It is desirable that for proper conduct of a workshop, not other similar programmes should be held concurrently.

5. CME Programme on "Health System Strengthening" held on 21st November, 2016 at the School of Public Health, PGIMER., Chandigarh.

Organizing Secretary: Dr. Arun Kumar Aggarwal, Professor, School of Public Health, PGIMER., Chandigarh – 160012.

Main objectivies of the CMS Programme:

- Given a set of health system related data, participants will be able to use and interpret to do root cause analysis and identify the bottlenecks using systems approach.
- For any health programme, participants will be able to identify implementation research questions and develop implementation research proposals.

- Participants will be able to use some existing mechanisms like Death Reviews, Information Technology, Telemedicine, Supportive Supervision, HMIS, etc to strengthen the health systems.
- Participants will develop understanding of concepts of communication, motivation, leadership, conflict management for organizational effectiveness.

Highlights of the Observer's (Dr. Rajesh Kumar, FAMS) Report

Total 28 participants registered of which 23 were present at observation. There were around 20 + variable sessions. The CME Programme was well organized with sufficient space, well equipped support of Faculty/Resource Persons audio-visual aids, fully functional facility of Videography and sound mixer systems installed was a successful academic Scientific Programme. Participants were encouraged for interactive discussions and clarifications. Group work and Role Plays were conducted in some sessions.

Providing the background of the CME, the organizers stated that health systems are supposed to deliver quality services to people at affordable price and ensure equity. According to WHO, health system consists of all organizations, people and actions whose primary interest is to promote, restore and maintain health. National Health Policy 2017 has gone beyond this and has included safe water and sanitation, Swachh Bharat and toilets for every one, etc. To implement and ensure their proper functioning is a challenge. We cannot achieve desirable health outcomes without strengthening the system. WHO has given the concept of building blocks of health systems: Governance, Financing, Service delivery, Health workforce, Information, and Medicines/ vaccines/other technologies, in a mutually enhancing way, to improve health outcomes, protect citizens from catastrophic financial loss and impoverishment due to illness, and ensure consumer satisfaction, in an equitable, efficient and sustainable manner.

In the first lecture, Dr. Krishna, a neonatologist discussed trends of Infant Mortality Rate (IMR), Neonatal Mortality Rate (NMR) and Post-

NMR over last one decade; he mentioned that IMR has declined by 34% with commensurate decline in Post-NMR. However, NMR has not changed much. He shared the targets to be achieved: U5MR of 25 by 2030 (SDG), IMR of 25 by 2017(MHM), and NMR of <10 by 2030 (INAP). With introduction of National health Mission (NHM), there was substantial impact on Post-NMR and Late-NMR. However, decline in Early-NMR was insignificant. Within first week also, 40% NMR occurs in first 24 hours and about 60% in 72 hours. Thus, probably programs that should work around time of birth are not working properly. Important causes of neonatal deaths are: prematurity (35%), birth asphyxia (20%), sepsis (15%), and pneumonia (16%). Thus, three most important killers that deserve attention are: preterm birth, complications, and neonatal infections. In the next lecture, Dr. Subodh deliberated on Inter Sectoral Coordination (ISC) in health care. To start with it was interactive- he asked participants: "Think what state of health you are in?" "Think what factors contribute to this state of health". He introduced W.H.O. definition of ISC. He deliberated on the factors responsible for effective group work. These are task functions and process functions. Task function relates to: how of getting group work completed and technical nature of task, e.g. for immunization role of ICD is mobilization and role of health deptt. in session management. The topic of Maternal and Child Death Reviews was discussed by Dr. Prasanth. He interacted to know participant's knowledge about the issues involved in the death reviews. He explained the differences in assigning "Causes of Death" to the "Factors and Delays for the death" and how this information would be useful for the health system. Participants told that death review meetings happen at district level and hospital level and were able to elicit some of the differences. Dr. Amerjeet Singh discussed the topic of Communication in Health. He drove home the point that verbal/spoken and written communication without appropriate change in tone (verbal) fonts (written) is not of any use. Main principle of effective communication were then outlined by him, which were much appreciated by the participants.

6. CME Programme on "Combating Anti Microbial Resistance" held on 9th February, 2017 at Late Shri Lakhiram Agrawal Memorial Government Medical College, Raigarh, Chattisgarh.

Organizing Secretary: Dr. Purnima Raj, Professor & Head, Department of Pharmacology, Late Shri Lakhiram Agrawal Memorial Medical College, Raigarh – 496001, Chhattisgarh.

Main Objectives of the CME Programme

- To describe why anti-microbial resistance (AMR) is a threat to human health.
- To differentiate the multiple mechanisms of how AMR develops.
- To analyse the "One Health" concept of multi-sectoral risk factors for AMR.
- To appreciate the positive steps that are taken in India towards containing/combating AMR.
- To construct strategies to combating AMR using the 'One Health' framework.
- To start a process of networking and learning from each other in a clinical set-up and how to minimize the dangers of AMR in India.

Expected Outcome from the participants of the CME/Workshop were to establish and maintain clinical knowledge, skills and attitudes appropriate to their practice:

- Apply knowledge of the clinical, socio-behaviouoral, and fundamental biomedical sciences relevant to the AMR
- Apply knowledge of mechanisms of antimicrobial resistance, adverse effects of drugs, etc. to prevent irrational use of antibiotics
- To Promote 'Stop AMR Campaign'
- To apply knowledge gained in the CME and suggest action plans for 'Stop AMR Campaign'

Highlights of the Observer's (Dr. K.K. Sharma, FAMS) Report

The CME started with the snapshot introductory remarks on the problem of anti-microbial resistance (AMR) by the CME Faculty Coordinator, Dr. Santanu Tripathi who stressed on the irrational and in discriminate use of antibiotics and its problems world over. However, specially in India, it is a cause for concern due to unregulated health care and limited financial

As per one estimate India was the largest consumer of antibiotics in the World. Causes for this are many, varying from poor public health indicators, rising incomes, availability of inexpensive antibiotics over-the-counter without a prescription and overuse and misuse of antibiotics by the medical practioners many of whom are quakes. Overuse of antibiotics dramatically contributes to the increased resistance and causes significant mortality, morbidity and increased health-care cost. We seem to be approaching a hopeless state of affairs when we shall wither away from benefits that had been achieved by "antibiotic-magic bullets" of yester years. This crisis assumed a serious proportions due to lack of development of new AMs. It is a matter that needs serious contemplation. The need of the hour is concerted and coordinated efforts by all to create a dedicated agency to monitors antibiotic use, to have important policies for encouraging appropriate and prudent use to antibiotics in public, private and informal health sectors and renew research efforts to develop newer antibiotics to manage the crisis. To discuss all these aspects and more about the issues, the present CME has been organized with several interactive sessions and requested all participants to be not only serious listeners but also to cross-talk, interact and give their valuable opinion and comments time to time.

In the second presentation the speaker dwelt on the pharmacokinetic, and pharmacodynamic aspects of AM prescribing, like: (i) concentration-dependent killing (CDK) antibiotics (aminoglycosides, FQs, rifampicim, metronidazole and its congeners), (ii) time-dependent killing (TDK) antibiotics (beta-lactums-penicillins, cephalosporins, carabenems and monobactums, macrolides, clindamycin) and (iii) others which are TDK with post-antibiotic effect (PAE) antibiotics (azithromycin, clarithromycin, longer acting tetracyclines, FQs, rifampicim, and a new anti-TB drug, delamanid). It was a stressed that rational use of antibiotics is possible with better understanding of PK-PD and mechanisms of development of AM resistance.

In the subsequent presentation, the speaker discussed the factors involved in developing the AMR. Environment and One-Health Approach where he emphasized that we know little about antibiotic resistome of environmental bacteria and therefore it is important to understand

antibiotic resistance reservoirs in the environment and their potential impact on health. Current strategies and interventions mainly focus on risk assessment in clinical settings while non-clinical environments are largely ignored. In the context of the global increase in antibiotic resistance bacteria and genes in the environment and to understanding the relevant stakeholders' perceptions, knowledge and beliefs regarding the problem. In the next two deliberations, speakers discussed the importance of qualitative research in AM stewardship. It was stressed that according to previous qualitative findings three major factors were recognized - patients, health systems and professionals, and policy and regulatory issues. The studies show that patients noncompliance with prescribers' instructions, self-medication, poverty ignorance about antibiotic use and lack of awareness about resistance were possible contributors to resistance development. In 2013 CDC published report on top 18 drug-resistant bacterial flora and a level of concerns were divided in three categories urgent, serious and concerning and classified different bacteria in each category. The CDC also devised Seven Core Elements of Hospital Antibiotic Stewardship Program which were discussed in detail. Antibiotic Stewardship Program, if followed in its letter and spirit may result in containing the many problems related to the AM resistance.

At the end of the lecture, four hands-on group dynamic exercises were given to four separate group of participants on different aspects covered in the deliberation. Each group was given 20 min to complete the task. One representative of the group presented the findings and arrived solution to the given task which was moderated by the CME Programme Convenor.

7. CME Programme on the "Research Methodology: Basics of Biomedical Research— Principles and Methods" held on 13th February, 2017 in the Department of Pharmacology, Patna Medical College and Hospital, Patna, (Bihar).

Main Objectives of the CME Programme

At the end of the event, the participants shall be able to:

- appreciate the need and purpose of biomedical research
- familiarize with the dimensions and methods of biomedical research
- know the components of a research protocol and understand how to write a good research Prtocol/Proposal
- develop a basic insight of data management and use of statistics in research
- understand the principles and processes of reporting research
- be exposed to nuances of research translation and translational research.

Highlights of the Observer's (Dr. K.K.Sharma, FAMS) Report

Overall ambience of the Workshop was very good. The venue of the CME was the same lecture theatre, where legendary medical scientist of India, Dr. B.C.Roy attended his MBBS classes in the Patna Medical College. This fact kept the participants in a very engaged and elated mood. As a result, of their interest in the CME subject and fruitful scientific discussions during and after the meeting with other delegates and Learned Faculty of the CME, the participants were very enthusiastic, serious and interactive in their involvement in the proceedings of the Workshop. Among the participants 5–6 were senior faculty members from the Department of Pharmacology and Medicine of Patna Medical College and rest were PGs and junior level faculty from various Medical Colleges and Pharmacy Institutions of the country.

In the first lecture on Biomedical and Health Research, the Speaker set the ball rolling by defining the health research as per WHO guidelines and stressed that the biomedical and health research is needed to bridge the knowledge gaps that exist in all areas of health care. Such gaps in understanding diseases, are in reference to their risk factors, etiopathogenesis, clinical presentation, diagnosis, prognosis, and their treatment, palliation, cure or prevention. Often the gaps are in translating the existing knowledge into healthcare practice. Therefore, for optimization of health care, biomedical and health research is indispensable. To accomplish this, priorities have to be set for actions.

The next speaker elaborated on the basic concepts required to write the Research Protocols for conducting research and getting grants from the funding agencies. Various domains – protocol contents, study methods, types of clinical trials and clinical research to improve clinical practice, RCTs, Observational studies, statistics, access to source data, protocol deviation(s) and violation, etc. were discuss. Ethical issues of clinical research were also covered – calculation of sample size/group size in clinical research/trials, alpha and beta errors and their role in calculation of sample size, recruitment of trial subjects, vulnerable research subjects, IES, PIS, ethical dilemmas –confidentiality, loyalty, elements of review of research protocols, etc were discussed.

In the lecture on Evidence-based clinical practice, hierarchy of Evidence and their 8 levels were discussed alongwith ethical issues involved in obtaining different category of evidence. In subsequent lectures different speakers covered the dimensions and methods of Biomedical Research – Primary and Secondary research, Descriptive studies, Analytical studies, Observational studies, Cross sectional, Cohort-, Case-control studies, Interventional study designs, Scientific Writing and Publication, manuscript preparation, role of medical statistics in analyzing the research data, types of the research data and drawing the inferences were discussed. After each lecture enough time was given to the participant to ask question and seek clarifications.

At the end of the lecture, four hands-on group dynamic exercises were given to four separate group of participants on different aspects covered in the deliberation. Each group was given 20min to complete the task. One representative of the group presented the findings and arrived solution to the given task which was moderated by the CME Programme Convenor.

8. CME Programme on the "Healthcare Leadership" held on 23rd February, 2017 at the Department of Community Medicine &

Family Medicine, All India Institute of Medical Sciences (AIIMS), Jodhpur, Rajasthan.

Main Objectives of the CME Programme

- To update the participants about different types of healthcare leadership skills
- To develop leadership skills among the participants, explaining the importance of team, enhancing their role as a trainer and demonstrating a positive attitude towards work.
- To encourage participants for opting appropriate life skills and leadership style in order to create a healthy environment at their workplace.

Highlights of the Observer's (Dr. Sanjay Chaturvedi, FAMS) Report

Healthcare systems are composed of numerous professional groups, departments, and specialties with intricate, nonlinear interactions between them; the complexity of such systems is often unparalleled as a result of constraints relating to different disease areas, multidirectional goals, and multidisciplinary staff. Within large organizations such as healthcare systems, the numerous groups with associated subcultures might support or be in conflict with each other. Leadership needs to capitalize on the diversity within the organization as a whole and efficiently utilize resources when designing management processes, while encouraging personal to work towards common goals. A number of leadership approaches can be adapted to the healthcare setting to optimize management in this highly complex environment. Leadership theory is dynamic and continues to change over time.

The deliberations of different resource persons and interactive hands-on and role- modeling sessions during the workshop made the participants

to develop leadership skill in healthcare field. It was evident by the feed-back received from the participants and it is hoped that a follow-up of the understanding of the subjects covered during the workshop will be useful for them to lead with high proficiency in their different health domains.

9. CME Programme on the "Principles in Trauma Management" held on 23rd February, 2017 at Pt. B.D. Sharma PGIMS., Rohtak, Haryana.

Organizing Secretary: Dr. R.C.Siwach, Senior Professor & Head, Department of Orthopaedics, PGIMS., Rohtak.

Main Objectives of the CME Programme

- How to handle a trauma patient
- What haematological and radiological investigations are necessary immediately following trauma?
- Urgent intervention required from trauma surgeon?
- How to deal with visceral and head injury-when and what to do?
- Multidisciplinary approach to a trauma patient?
- What are immediate or late indications for ICU requirement?

Highlights of the Observer's (Dr. Anil K. Jain, FAMS) Report

The one-day course was attended by 58 Orthopaedic Surgeons, Private practitioners and 96 Junior Residents of orthopaedics and 2 MBBS Students (total 156) to learn various aspects of Trauma Management with topics varying from Triage, ABC of Trauma Management to intricacies of Pelvic Injuries and management of Polytrauma cases. The Faculty consisted of 30 teachers (Senior Professors and Experts) from all over India mainly from northern region of India.

The lecture theatre facilities and audio visual aids were of high order. The topics chosen for symposium were well suited for the focused group of trainees. Take-home messages were given at the end of every talk and at the end of the session.

Overall, it was a great academic cum scientific program for the Orthopedic Surgeons/Residents and medical students that updated their knowledge in Trauma Management which they encounter in their day-to-day practice and a close experience with the rare cases in orthopaedics. The participants were benefited from the experience of eminent faculty of the course which was freely available for the learners in an environment of encouraged discussion. The candidates were satisfied with the CME and had a very educative experience. In the end, I am highly indebted to all the Faculty of the CME and delegates for making this CME a grand success which fulfilled its all objectives in right scientific spirit and fervour.

Report of Academic Committee & Academic Council

To consider the points discussed regarding CME in the Special Council Meeting held on 21st March, 2017

A hard copy of the Minutes of the Special Council Meeting held on 21st March, 2017 was provided to the members of the Academic Committee for discussion. The points related to CME and Medical Education was discussed in detail. The outcome of the discussion was as under:

- The members were of the view that more CME Programmes may be organized.
- If the Academic Programme is being telecast at different medical colleges, the registration of all the participants should be necessary. The connected institutions should also have the facility for interaction with the speakers.
- During the discussion with the Ministry they suggested that if NAMS can take an active part in providing training to the nurses. To this Dr. S.S. Deshmukh agreed to submit a proposal for CME Programme on Nursing training at Mumbai as early as possible.
- The members were of the view that while doing anything new the NAMS should be very cautious and preventive while taking any steps.
- The NAMS Chapter needs to be strengthened. It was also suggested to have a co-convenor where the Convenor's are not very active. Finally it was decided to reappoint/revise list of state chapter convenors as early as possible by Dr. K.K. Sharma.

To consider modification in the Guidelines including for Financial Support for CME Programme

The Council in principle agreed to sanction the grant-in-aid for Extramural CME Programmes maximum upto Rs.2 lakhs, and for Intramural CME Programmes maximum upto Rs.2.5 lakhs. There is a need to make

distribution of funds in different heads. The Committee authorized Dr. K.K. Sharma, CME Co-ordinator to make the distribution with flexibility so that NAMS get more proposals.

To consider and recommend Lifetime Achievement Award for the year 2017

In the 122nd Council Meeting, held on the 12th July, 2008, it was unanimously decided that the nominations for the NAMS Lifetime Achievement Award will be made by the Members of the Academic Council, which will then be considered by the Orations and Awards Committee and the recommendation of the Orations and Awards Committee will be placed before the Council for approval.

The Academic Committee proposed the name of Dr. P.K. Dave, Former Director and HOD AIIMS and Emeritus Professor, NAMS for Lifetime Achievement Award for the year 2017. The biodata of Dr. P.K. Dave was read by Secretary & the proposal was unanimously accepted as proposed by Dr. S.S. Deshmukh and seconded by Dr. Saroj C. Gopal.

To consider a letter received from Dr. Anil Kumar Singhi: reg. inclusion of FNB examination by the National Board of Examination as an eligibility criteria for the Membership of the NAMS

An e-mail dated 23rd August and also a letter was received from Dr. Anil Kumar Singhi, MD, FNB (Paed Card), Hiland Part, Tower GLEN, Flat 10A1, 1925 Chakgaria, Panchasayar, Behind Metropolis Mall E M Bypass, Kolkata-700094 requesting to enroll him for the prestigious Membership of NAMS on the basis of FNB.

As per Regulation V "Application for Award of Members by passing Examination conducted by NBE: states Those candidates who pass the examination conducted by the National Board of Examinations will individually submit an application for admission as Member of the National Academy of Medical Sciences, duly proposed by at least one Fellow of the Academy certifying the character and conduct of the candidate. Subject to the approval of the Council of the National Academy of Medical Sciences, the candidate will be admitted as member after paying one time life subscription fee of Rs.7,000/- (inclusive of admission fee of Rs.1,000)

as may be determined from time to time, and after executing the Bond of Obligation. (This will be effective from the batch who passed the N.B. Examination held in November 1992 and onwards)"

After a detailed discussion, the Committee did not approve the enrolment of the FNB students as MNAMS and decided not to discuss it further.

The Medical Scientists' Exchange Programme (Health Manpower Development)

One of the activities promoted by the Academy under Continuing Medical Education Programme in the area of Health Manpower Development is the Exchange of Medical Scientists' possessing positions at junior and middle levels.

The Academy provides funding to junior and middle level specialists/ scientists to go to well established centers of excellence and acquire new/ newer skills. Under the scheme, the selected nominees are eligible for reimbursement of traveling expenses (limited to actual II class AC two-tier rail fare) and D.A. @ Rs.300/- per diem during the training period subject to a maximum of Rs.5,000/-

Two hundred (200) Medical Scientists/Teachers have been selected for advance training upto the year 2017 and have successfully completed their proposed training programmes after getting the grant-in-aid from the NAMS.

Report on Intramural CME Programme held during the period from 01.04.2016 to 31.03.2017

 NAMS-PGI Symposium on "Osteoporosis" held on April 23rd, 2016 at Postgraduate Institute of Medical Education & Research, Chandigarh

Main Objectives of the CME Programme:

The Objectives of the Symposium were:

To spread awareness about the prevalence, clinical, spectrum, pathogenesis, diagnosis and treatment of Osteoporosis.

Highlights of the Observer's (Dr.R.L. Mittal) Report:

The main objectives of the CME Programme-to spread awareness about the prevalence, clinical spectrum, pathogenesis, diagnosis and treatment of osteoporosis. At the end, participants will be able to diagnose & manage patients of osteoporosis. The objectives of the symposium were fulfilled but not completely. The topic chosen was very good, which has a tremendous importance in view of increasing longevity in our country and increasing population of super senior citizens and numerous other factors. The organizer worked hard and did a very good job in achieving the objectives of the seminar for which it was organized, but there is always scope for improvement. It could have been much better if (i) involvement of orthopaedic surgeon, endocrinologist, gynecologist, pharmacologist, physical medicine & rehab. specialist, geriatrist etc has been assured as Osteoporosis is a multidisciplinary disease and for a better delivery of objective, lectures should be designed

after consulting all local specialists; (ii) if the lectures should relate to the topics only. Orthopaedic surgeons have a primary role in osteoporosis. Every osteoporosis patient has consulted an orthopaedic surgeon, before consulting an endocrinologist and in fact, more often than not, it is a referral to endocrinologist from an orthopaedic surgeon. Trauma has assumed a very important role in total percentage of hospital patients and every such patient is confronted with osteoporosis, local or general. Not only trauma, but all bed ridden patients after 50 or so in all specialities can have osteoporosis and need orthopaedic consultation; (iii) if the participants were more - About 150 registrations were expected, but there were only 47 registrants. All residents of various specialities (osteoporosis relates to all specialities as stated above), except those on emergency duty, could have attended it to achieve the objective in a much better way. Involvement of all heads of departments could have ensured that for delivery of objectives. (iv) Audio-visual & acoustics in the hall were very good. However, the tele-medicine part needs to be improved as regards number of participants at the other ends, audio-visuals and the communication system like we see on T.V for better interaction. (v) Looking to the importance of subject, such programme on osteoporosis, improving on the lacunae I have pointed out, be held reguraly. The booklet with all the lectures was given to all. There was good discussion after each lecture.

2. NAMS Symposium on "**Tobacco or Health: Make Better Choice**" held on October 21, 2016 at All India Institute of Medical Sciences, Raipur

Pilot Project

On the request of the President, NAMS, a Council Meeting for a specific purpose regarding Operationalisation of the Auditorium was held on 29th October, 2015. The President's idea was operationalized with the start of 'Expert Group Meeting to evolve Guidelines on "Prevention Management and Rehabilitation in Stroke – A Multi-professional Team Approach" which was inagurated on World Stroke Day at Smt. Kamla Raheja Auditorium in Prof. J.S. Bajaj Centre for Multiprofessional Education. The Expert Group Meeting, to evolve Guidelines, was conducted by Dr. Sanjay Wadhwa, Vice President-NAMS. No funding was done for the programme.

On the issue of increasing CMEs and to make full use of the Auditorium, the President, NAMS in Council Meetinng held on 17th September, 2016 suggested constitution of a Sub-Committee for 'Enhancing holding of CMEs at the Auditorium' under the Chairmanship of Dr. P.K. Dave, FAMS. In the same meeting Dr. M.V. Padma Srivastava raised the issue of funding of the CME Programme to be held at the NAMS Auditorium be disbursed by the NAMS office itself. After a detailed discussion the matter was forwarded to the Academic Committee/CME Programme Committee for consideration

Minutes of Finance Committee held on 16th December, 2016 vide Item No. 6 "Any other Item, with the permission of the Chair" discussed Proposal for exploring pilot project under the name 'Enhancing Utilization of Auditorium as Pilot Study' for conducting Academic Activities at Smt. Kamla Raheja Auditorium and Prof. J.S. Bajaj Centre for Multi-professional Education. The proposal was discussed in detail in the Meeting and further approved by the Council in its meeting held on 6th July, 2017 as under:

"....They therefore requested that the application sent through the NAMS convener Delhi and the funds, for these programmes being conducted in the Auditorium, may be kept with NAMS and let the bills for expenditure be paid/managed by the NAMS staff from the sanctioned funds of these programmes.

Report of Summary/Lectures Delivered by Emeritus Professors of NAMS 2016-17

- 1. Summary of Lectures delivered by Dr. T.D. Chugh, Emeritus Professor, NAMS
 - (i) Tropical Fevers: An Overview, September 2016, Jodhpur

Tropical fevers are unique to tropical and subtropical regions, may be zoonotic or vector-borne, may occur especially in rainy or postrainy season when insect population is high, have overlapping clinical presentations and often have high morbidity and mortality. Their diagnosis requires a detailed laboratory work-up and treatment requires syndromic approach. These may present as undifferential fever, fever with rash, ARDS, encephalopathy, multiorgan failure or renal or hepatic failure. The spectrum of aetiology has a geographic variation and depends on the extent to which laboratory studies have been made.

Tropical fevers also known as Acute undiagnosed undifferentiated fever (AUF) is different from fever or Pyrexia of unknown origin (FUO or PUO) as the former is of 21 days or less duration while PUO is of more than 21 days duration.

AUF may be caused by a virus (dengue, influenza, RSV, Chikungunya, EB, Enterovirus, SARS, Japanese B, HSV); bacteria (rickettsia, miliary tuberculosis, leptospira, legionella, pneumococcus) a parasite (plasmodia, leishmanial, amoebic liver abscess, acute schistosomiasis) or there may be mixed infections. Metagenomics and next-generation sequencing have identified occult and previously unidentified pathogens.

It is necessary to have an epidemiological database so that evidence-based diagnostic and management algorithms can be developed. Further, insight into the immunological understanding of disease mechanism and proactive mechanism are required. We in India have only a sketchy data of these from a few tertiary care centres. We need more population based data of tropical fevers.

(ii) Nosocomial Transmission of Tuberculosis, on 30th September, 2016 at CARE Hospital, Hyderabad.

Nosocomial tuberculosis (NT) was first described by Devoto when he infected guinea pigs with hospital dust. Since then, several studies from Europe and North America show nosocomial transmission of the disease in hospital wards including HIV and MDR-MTB wards. CDC first laid guidelines in 1994 and then revised in 2005 for prevention of NT. In 1999, WHO laid down guidelines for resourcelimited countries. India has a huge burden of TB, both latent and clinical cases, and also MDR-MTB. However, no clear data or guidelines are available. No studies were reported from India till 2004 when 125 Health care workers (HCWS) were treated for active TB (1992-2001), 43 had extrapulmonary and 5% with MDR repot in CMC Vellore. The report also stated that this was an underestimate. Since then, reports from Chandigarh, Sevagram, Pune and Delhi have also been published. These studies clearly show that active TB is 10 fold higher in nurses, interns and residents in hospitals in India. This is often recent as evidenced by the disease being often extrapulmonary.

India needs awareness guidelines for diagnosis, treatment and prevention at government and institutional level to protect the health of our HCWs, who are essential in our battle against TB.

2. Summary of Lectures delivered by Dr. Shridhar Sharma, Emeritus Professor, NAMS

(i) Preventive Psychistry: An Over View, on 21st July, 2016 at AIIMS, New Delhi.

The concept of prevention in psychiatry is evolving but its boundary

is less defined. Prevention psychiatry aims at the reduction of mental disorders and behavioral problems by identifying risk and protective factors and applying evidence-based interventions in the frame work of primary, secondary and tertiary prevention. Preventive psychiatry, located within a public mental health framework, provides an opportunity to recognize important preventive elements in existing psychiatric practice. Mental health professionals have several important roles to play in the prevention field. These include their role of mental health adovocates, technical advisers, programme leaders, researchers and preventive care providers.

(ii) Globalization and Diversity: Emerging Challenges and Opportunities in the Field of Mental at WASP from 30th November to 4th December, 2016

In the recent past, the phenomenon of globalization has attracted world attention and has emerged the most dominant force in the global system of economics, with significant ramification in all other spheres of contemporary human existence including health and mental health.

Globalization brings culturally, economically and politically distinct but distant parts of the World, functionally closer. This has been due to the rapid growth of technology and global economics in a politically unipolar world. The globalization has changed World scene and has to be seen at both macro and micro level. At a macro level, globalization gives rise to certain changes in health policy and at micro level has implication for consumers and local development. There are also completing and conflicting interest between and within countries of the North and the south. The resulting crisis has its roots in the market economy. Globalization has certainly provided new opportunity to physicians and benefits to patients but also resulted into certain constraints to the consumers in the developing countries.

The potential impact of globalization is seen on a whole range of

contemporary social, economic, political and health fields. Because of globalization's multifaceted nature, it is essential to grasp its impact on health and mental health and also to recognize the different ways its influence is seen. It is now increasing perceived as a more comprehensive phenomenon which is shaped by multitude of factors and events that are influencing our society. The paper will delineate the challenges and opportunities in the field of mental health.

iii) WASP History in Asia

The term Social Psychiatry had a long tradition. In 1803 Reil introduced the word "Psychiatry". It was in 1903 the term 'Social' was first linked to Psychiatry, when Georg Ilberg from Grob-Schweidnitz asylum in Saxony wrote a paper entitled simply "Soziale Psychiatrie" Ilbarg defined Social Psychiatry as a theory of the detrimental influences that affected the mental health of the whole population and of useful means for their prevention.

Total, Social Psychiatry is concerned with the relationship between disorders of the mind and the human environment. It studies the forces which act at the interface between individuals and those around them, and of which may contribute to the onset, course, and outcome of mental disorders.

In 1964, Joshna Bierer organized the first International Congress of Social Psychiatry. The International Association for Social Psychiatry later become the World Association for Social Psychiatry. During the first decade the WASP activities and congress were localized mostly in European Countries. In 1984 during the annual meeting of Indian Psychiatric Society in Ranchi, a core committee of Indian Association for Social Psychiatry (IASP) was formed and the first Congress was held in Kodaikanal in Tamil Nadu. Since then the Indian Association has grown much stronger and is playing bigger role in the growth of the WASP. IASP has organized three World Congresses of Social Psychiatry and has given two Presidents to the WASP. Besides India, Japan has also made impressive contribution

to the cause of the WASP. Thus today Social Psychiatry in Asia has a greater relevance and has a bright future. The paper will highlight the growth of Social Psychiatry in other Asian Countries.
